These words of St. Jeanne Jugan illustrate her deep devotion to Mary. The rosary was her great method of prayer. St. Jeanne trusted that Mary knew all her needs and as a true Mother, Mary saw to it that all was provided for the happiness of her elderly poor.

St. Jeanne Jugan was nearly blind in her final years. She needed assistance wherever she went. She was unable to read or do much by herself. But, she always held her rosary clasped tightly in her hand. She would often say, “Let us say a Hail Mary together” as a gesture of thanksgiving.

On August 29, 1879 as she lay dying, in a faint voice she whispered, “O Mary, my dear

mother, come to me. You know I love you and how I long to see you!” Then she quietly passed away. She was 86 years old.

Great devotion to our Blessed Mother continues here in our Home today. Especially during the month of May, we confide our intentions, as well as the needs of our Home to Mary. In good times and in more difficult times, we are comforted to know that she is with us every moment. Through her motherly intercession, she carries all our intentions to her son, Jesus.

The rosary is prayed daily in our chapel before our 11:00 a.m. Mass. Residents, Little Sisters and staff welcome you to join us.

## Volunteer Recognition

Each spring during National Volunteer Week, the Little Sisters host a volunteer luncheon. The Order of Malta assists in organizing the award recognition program and join in celebrating the Mass preceding the luncheon.

“The dedication of the volunteers is inspiring,” states Mary Winzen, D.M. who supervises the volunteer office and tracks hours. “In recent years, we have recognized a total of 7 volunteers with thirty years of service and 13 volunteers for twenty five years.”

There are currently over 125 active volunteers in our Home helping where needed in crafts, activities, ceramics, laundry, the dining room, the volunteer office, music, visiting, feeding, sewing and, of course, the popular yearly holiday boutique. The service contributed in 2012 totaled an impressive 23,935 hours.

The volunteer program in our Home has a long and interesting history. It dates back to the mid-1970’s. At a meeting of the Order of Malta, held at our Home in Boyle Heights, members discussed creating auxiliaries that would offer personal service to the sick and the poor. Our Home was chosen for the first formalized auxiliary.

To be inducted, a volunteer was required to complete 300 hours and three years of service and plan to continue their work of 100 hours of service each year. This standard remains in place today.

In 1979 as the move to San Pedro became eminent, Grace Byrnes, a Dame of Malta, enlisted other members to transport Residents to the new Home on moving day. Thus our relationship with the Order of Malta and its new auxiliary

for volunteers was transferred to Jeanne Jugan Residents.

In San Pedro, other Knights and Dames continued to assist with the volunteer group known as the Jeanne Jugan Auxiliary of the Order of Malta.

## Thank You for 29 Years of Service!


“A friend of mine told me to apply for work at the Little Sisters. I didn’t know much about them,” explains George King. “In 1984 I joined the maintenance crew.”

## Students Learn and Contribute

Los Angeles Harbor College Students studying for their associate degree in Registered Nursing are a welcome site in the halls of our Home. Student groups regularly come during the fall and spring semesters under the supervision of a LAHC faculty member.

For their four week geriatric rotation at the Little Sisters, the students gain clinical experience to augment their theoretical classroom instructions. Each group is well organized and monitored as they follow and learn from our charge nurses. Activities include charting and documentation, condition assessment, feeding and other daily living necessities.

The students appreciate the example of our staff and Little Sisters. They particularly notice the sincere affection for the Residents and the great camaraderie among the staff. From the nursing team to housekeeping to dietary, everyone works together to make the elderly comfortable and happy.

Following this example, the students quickly begin to engage in conversation with the Residents and welcome the opportunity to participate in daily activities. Of course the Residents enjoy the added attention from these vibrant young students who add a new level of energy and enjoyment to their day.

“The students ask very good questions of me as the charge nurse,” explains Christina Son, RN an employee who graduated from the LAHC program. “By conversing and interacting with the Residents the students learn about the needs of older adults and age-related conditions. The Residents are the best teachers!”

## Our Needs

The need currently is for financial support for ongoing plumbing repairs. Because of age and usage, the present plumbing has had numerous problems. The costs in 2012 exceeded \$50,000. This is expected to continue.

The plumbing on campus is used 24/7 and supports approximately 100 Residents, 9 Little Sisters, fulltime and part-time employees, plus numerous volunteers, family and friends.

The administrative building and the Laundry Building were constructed in the late 1960's. The Residence Building was completed in 1979. A large part of the plumbing in all areas is original and subject to surprise problems.

Social Security Income, pensions, and government aid pay only part of the cost of caring for our elderly residents. Each

year we must raise funds for operating costs, repairs and improvements.
