Our consecrated life is lived as a public, corporate witness of God’s awesome love and mercy in the heart of the Church.

Prayer is the hidden source from which our vocation of love and service springs. It is the force which unifies the various elements of our life, leading us to have one heart and one will with Jesus.

Moments of communal and personal prayer each day include:

- Mass;
- Communal celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours;
- A period of meditation at the beginning of each day and another half-hour of personal prayer before the Blessed Sacrament;
- Rosary;
- Lectio divina & spiritual reading.

As we cultivate a life of intimacy with God, we appreciate the value of silence. With this in mind, we strive to maintain an oasis of quiet and peace in our commu-

nity areas. Our meals are usually taken in silence. We look forward to several retreat opportunities throughout the year, as these help us to refresh ourselves at the fountain of God’s love and to remain in him.

Community life is built around the permanent presence of the Eucharist – for Christ is the center and source of our unity.

Each of our communities really is like a little family, where we share our joys and sorrows, as well as the work confided to us by the Church.

Catholic women and men at least 18 years of age who are interested in joining the Association participate in a yearlong program of formation. Membership is formalized by an annual promise, which the Association

members renew on May 1st, the feast of St. Joseph the Worker.

The simplest way to designate a gift is by stating: "I give to the Little Sisters of the Poor, located at 2100 S. Western Ave. in San Pedro, CA to be used at their discretion, the following gift. For example:

- \_\_\_\_% (Amount in percent) of my estate
- The residual of my estate (after other gifts)
- Specific stock, property, policy or asset.

Remember there may be tax benefits that come from your gift, such as a deduction from income tax, avoidance of capital gain tax, and avoidance of estate tax.
